
Senior Exit Plans Survey

Class of 1997

Introduction

Background and Purpose

An annual statewide survey of public high school seniors was conducted by the Department of Education (DOE) in the spring of 1997 to obtain information regarding the students' post-high school plans.

Purposes of the survey are:

- ❖ To find out, on a statewide basis, the education and employment plans of seniors after graduation; and
- ❖ To find out what kind of planning assistance is needed at the individual schools.

The *Senior Exit Plans Survey* (SEPS) was initiated in 1992 to provide information about our graduating students on a statewide basis to address inquiries from offices within the DOE, institutions of higher learning, state and federal government departments, legislators, businesses, organizations, and individuals in the community. The survey gives a picture of what general options our public high school seniors are considering.

The SEPS also provides schools with data for school improvement planning and school accountability. The data may have implications for addressing student needs via a school's counseling and guidance program, vocational education program, etc.

This report is a statewide summary based on aggregating data collected in a survey of all 1997 seniors from 38 of the regular Hawai'i public high schools.¹ Information was collected on plans for post high school education and other, non-academic plans such as military service, employment, and other plans. Those planning to attend school were also asked to indicate the type of school and the location of the school they intended to attend.

Other Studies

The SEPS augments the *Graduate Follow-Up Survey* (GFUS) which is currently conducted by

the DOE for public high schools scheduled for the accreditation process. The SEPS serves as a “pre-type” glimpse into seniors’ post high school activities, while the GFUS provides “post-type” information on graduates’ actual employment and educational status approximately one year after graduation. The last GFUS that was a census of all public high school graduates was with the Class of 1989. Since then, GFUS has become a joint effort between the DOE Evaluation Section and those schools that decide they need graduate information provided through the GFUS for their self-study process. Under the current plan, GFUS is scheduled once every six years for each participating school.

Methods and Procedures

School personnel, usually a counselor, conducted the survey of all seniors enrolled in April, May, or June 1997 in most of the schools. Recognizing the need to minimize the burden of a survey at the close of the school year, schools were allowed to use existing procedures and forms. A prototype student survey form was provided by the Evaluation Section for those schools that did not already have a survey form. Schools were asked to summarize specific survey data on a school summary report, “Summary of Senior Exit Plans,” and to submit the summary to the Evaluation Section by early June 1997. Only summary totals were reported. Schools were asked to specify the “Other” schools or plans that the seniors had (see Appendix A for a sample copy of the report form).

Response Rate

Summary reports were received from 38 high schools with graduating seniors. There were 10,198 seniors enrolled when the school surveys were conducted. Of this number, 9,096 seniors were accounted for by completed forms, for a response rate of 89.2% (see Table 1). District response rates ranged from 78% to 98%, while individual school response rates ranged from 25% to slightly more than 100%.²

Non-response can limit the generalizability of survey findings. With a response rate of 75% or more, survey results may be interpreted as generally representative of the school’s seniors. Response rates for districts and individual high schools are displayed in Appendix B.

Students were asked to indicate what they would *most likely* be doing the year after graduation. They were allowed to give multiple responses if their plans included more than one option. For

example, a student who planned to attend school *and* work may give two responses. Thus, there was a total of 11,528 responses given by the 9,096 seniors. Percentages given in the text, figures, and tables are based on the total number of seniors responding to the survey. However, in the discussion of seniors planning to attend school, only those planning to attend school are used as the basis (denominator) for the percentages.

Summary of Findings

Exit Plans

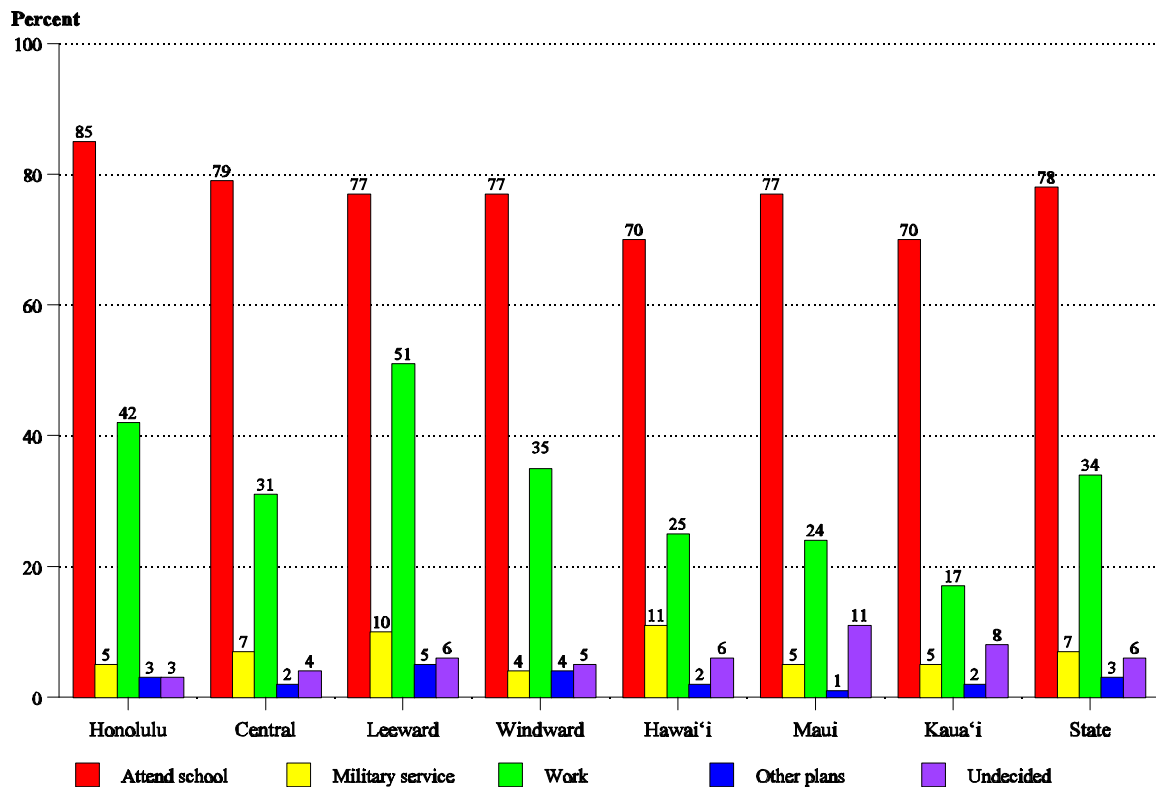


Figure 1. State and district summaries of seniors' post high school plans

Over three-quarters (77.6%) of the seniors plan to continue their education. Nearly seven percent of the seniors intend to join the military (6.7%), while one-third of the seniors plan to work either full time (12.0%) or part time (21.9%). Relatively few have “other plans” (3.1%), and about six percent (5.5%) of the seniors are undecided about their plans after graduation (see Table 2 and Figure 1).

A review of district totals for the seniors’ plans shows that the proportion of seniors planning to attend school ranges from a high of 84.7% in Honolulu to a low of 69.5% in Kaua‘i. Hawai‘i reported the highest proportion entering military service (10.5%). Leeward has the highest proportions of seniors planning to work (50.9%) and having other plans (5.2%). Seniors in Maui were the most undecided about their post-high school plans (10.9%).

Educational Plans: School Type

The seniors who plan to attend school were asked to identify the type of school they planned to attend. Of the 7,056 respondents in this category, 41.6% plan to attend a four-year college or university, 50.5% plan to attend a community college, 6.3% plan to attend a trade school or business school, and 1.7% have plans for other educational pursuits (see Table 3).

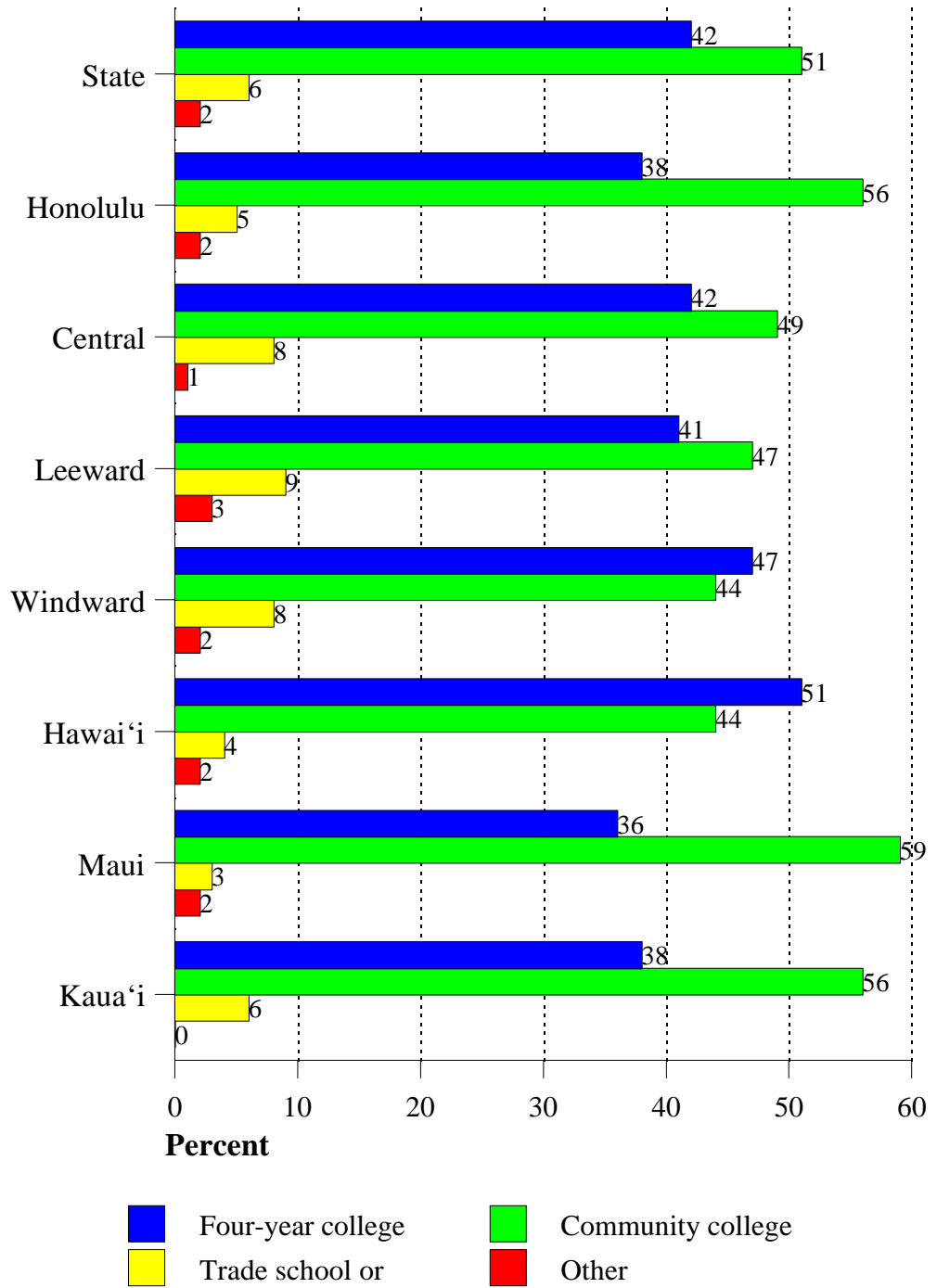


Figure 2. State and district summaries of types of school seniors plan to attend

District data on seniors who plan to continue their schooling show that of the seven school districts, Hawai'i has the highest proportion of seniors planning to attend a four-year college or university (50.6%) and Maui has the lowest (36.3%). At the same time, Maui has the highest proportion planning to attend a community college (58.9%) while Windward (43.7%) and Hawai'i (43.6%) have the lowest. Leeward has the highest proportion of seniors (9.1%) planning to attend trade or business school. Seniors planning to attend other schools range from 2.6% in Leeward to 0.2% in Kauai (see Figure 2).

Educational Plans: School Location

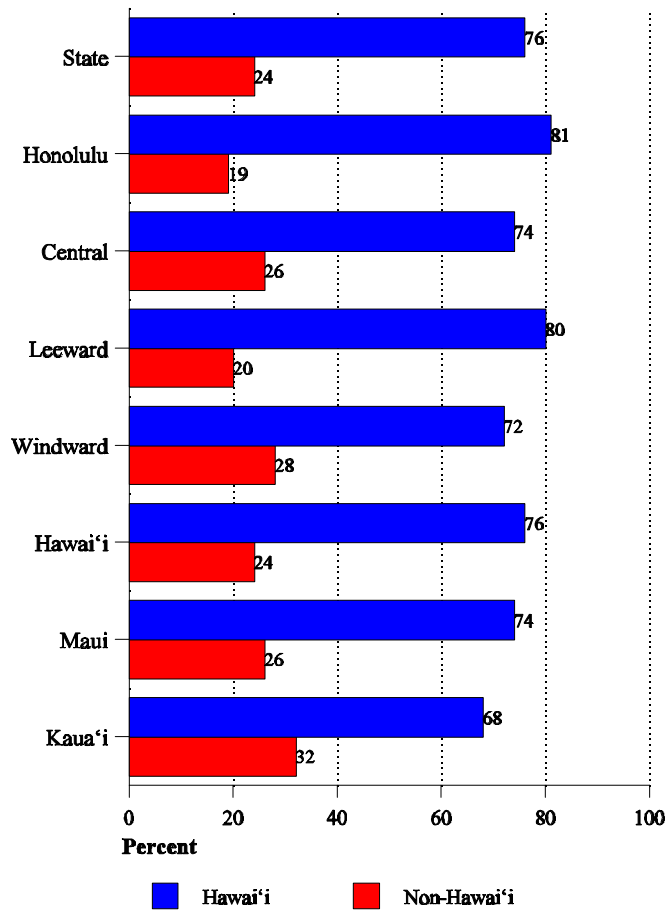


Figure 3. State and district summaries of location of schools seniors plan to attend

Students who plan to attend school were also asked if they were remaining in Hawai'i or going to school elsewhere. Statewide, slightly more than three-quarters (76.1%) of the responses in this category were plans for continued education in Hawai'i. District data reveal that the Honolulu district (81.2%) has the highest percentage of seniors who plan to attend school in Hawai'i. Kaua'i (31.6%) has the highest proportion of seniors planning to attend schools outside of Hawai'i (see Table 4 and Figure 3).

Other Plans

There were 278 seniors, 3.1% of the respondent group, with plans other than school, full or part time work, or military service. Other plans most frequently reported were marriage/parenthood, travel/vacation/time off, move to the mainland or a foreign country, and religious mission/ministry.

District and School Summaries

Individual district and school summaries are given in Appendices B and C.

Conclusions

The results of the 1997 Senior Exit Plans Survey, with small variations, are generally similar to those of the 1995 and 1996 surveys. By far, the greatest number of seniors plan to attend school: Class of 1997 – 77.6%; Class of 1996 – 79.3%; Class of 1995 – 79.0%. Most of those planning to attend school enroll in community colleges. The proportion of seniors who plan to work full time (12.0%) is slightly higher than that of the Class of 1995 (10.1%) but lower than the Class of 1996 (14.0%).

Nearly 22 percent of the Class of 1997 intend to work part time. Examination of the *Graduate Follow-Up Survey* results for the Class of 1996 indicates that half of the graduates who attended school full time were also employed in part time work, while nearly all of the students in school part time were also employed part time. Overall, according to GFUS results, less than five percent of the seniors who had graduated the previous year were “idle” – neither in school nor working.

In the 1994 Senior Exit Plans Survey report, reference was made to a special study conducted to determine how consistent senior plans were with the follow-up data of graduates from three high schools. It was found that senior exit plans are an effective means of predicting students’ post high school education and work status. Exit plans data provide useful information that is uniform and current. However, when response rates are below 75%, some caution should be exercised in generalizing findings to the entire graduating class.
