### Focus On Standards

This School Status and Improvement Report has been prepared as part of the Department's education accountability system to provide regular, understandable accounts of our schools' performance and progress, as required by §302A-1004, Hawai'i Revised Statutes.

This report describes the school and its setting; provides information about the school's administrators, teachers, students and facilities; summarizes progress made based on the school's improvement plan, and reports student achievement results along with other vital signs.

### School Description

Ke Kula Kaipuni 'O Anuenue is the Hawai'i State Department of Education's K-12 Hawaiian Language Immersion School on the island of O'ahu. Some students enter kindergarten with Hawaiian language proficiency from Punana Leo Pre-schools. Other students enter with little to no Hawaiian language abilities. Seventh grade students enter from other elementary schools such as Nanakuli, Waiiau, Pu'ohala (Kaneohe), and Hau'ula that have Hawaiian Language Immersion classes.

Students come from all over the island. There are buses that bring students from Windward, Central and Leeward O'ahu. 100% of the students attend on a geographic exception.

All classes and subjects are taught through the medium of the Hawaiian language except English. Through the Hawaiian language and culture, students are taught to value their Hawaiian heritage and personal well-being.

The geographic setting is a lush seven-acre campus deep in Palolo Valley above Waikiki. Taro patches and aquaculture tanks complement the environment and curriculum. Pukele Stream, which is part of the Ala Wai Watershed, enhances the curriculum and environment.

The 2005-2006 School Year marked the tenth anniversary of the school as a Hawaiian Language Immersion School. It has been accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges since the first graduating class in 1999. The school is currently accredited through 2007.

In 2002, Anuenue School was recognized as an outstanding Blue Ribbon School. However, under the No Child Left Behind Act the school has been marked as a school in status or needing improvement. Although unfair, the staff, students and parents have been trying very hard to make improvements while maintaining the essential Hawaiianess of the school.

A school Community Council (SCC) is in place at the school. The council is implementing the Academic and Financial Plan (AFP).

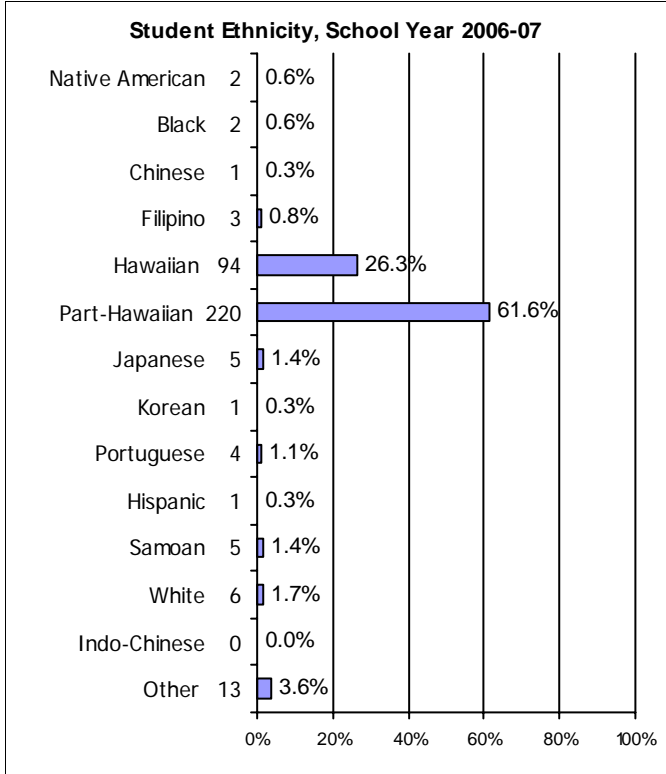
The high school belongs to O'ahu Interscholastic Association (OIA) and the Hawai'i High School Athletic Association (HHSAA). The school has teams in football, volleyball, cheerleading, Hawaiian canoe paddling, basketball, girls' softball, and track and field. Students may participate in other team or individual sports at Roosevelt High School.

The school serves two important missions. First is to help the students learn to the best of their abilities. Second is to preserve the Hawaiian language and culture and to maintain those things that make Hawai'i, Hawai'i.

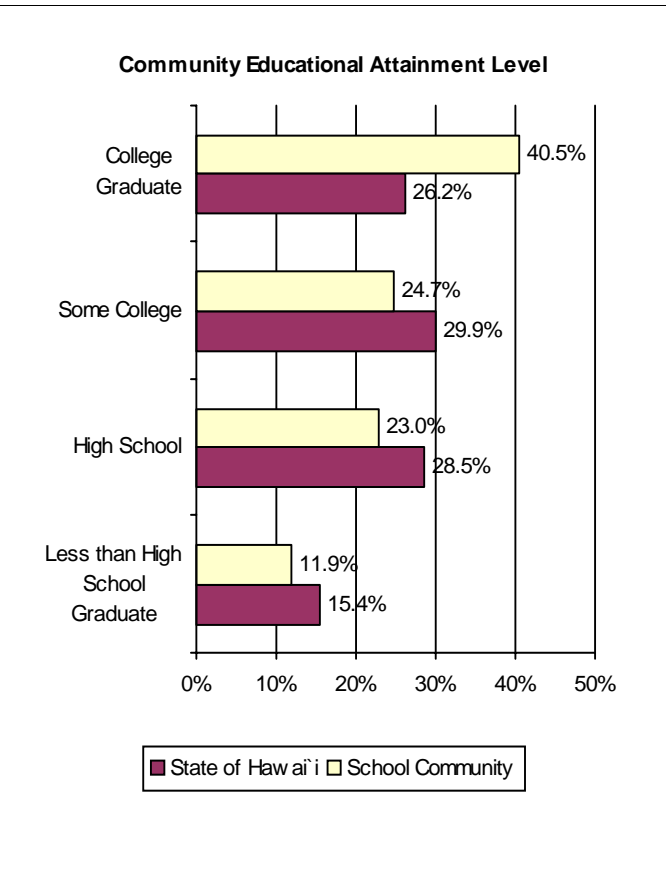

## School Improvement

### Summary of Progress

#### Goal 1 – Improve Student Achievement through Standards-based Education

Anuenue School met the performance targets for ninth grades promoted and percent of grade 12 students graduating with a diploma. The school met safe harbor or acceptable progress in reading.

However, the math targets were not met. This put the school under restructuring. Again, the fairness of the testing remains a critical issue.

A highlight was the establishment and work of the Anuenue Support Team (AST). The Leadership Coach, Project Coordinator, Academic Coaches and District Personnel worked very hard with the school personnel to help the students, teachers, administrators, and the other school personnel. They really helped with the restructuring efforts and accreditation.

#### Goal 2 – Provide Comprehensive Support to all Students

Anuenue School met the performance targets of increasing Comprehensive Student Support System services and service learning. The Student Services Coordinator (SSC) made a point of introducing and explaining the CSSSS serves to the entire faculty. Service learning was acknowledged with the HMSA Kaimana Award won by the school.

The school did not meet the average daily attendance target. The school safety targets will come out with the next School Status and Improvement Report (SSIR) results.

#### Goal 3 – Continuously Improve Performance and Quality

Anuenue School met the performance target of teachers at school 5+ years. The school improved on Highly Qualified Teachers (HQT). The parent and teacher satisfaction targets will also come out with the next School Status and Improvement Report (SSIR) results.

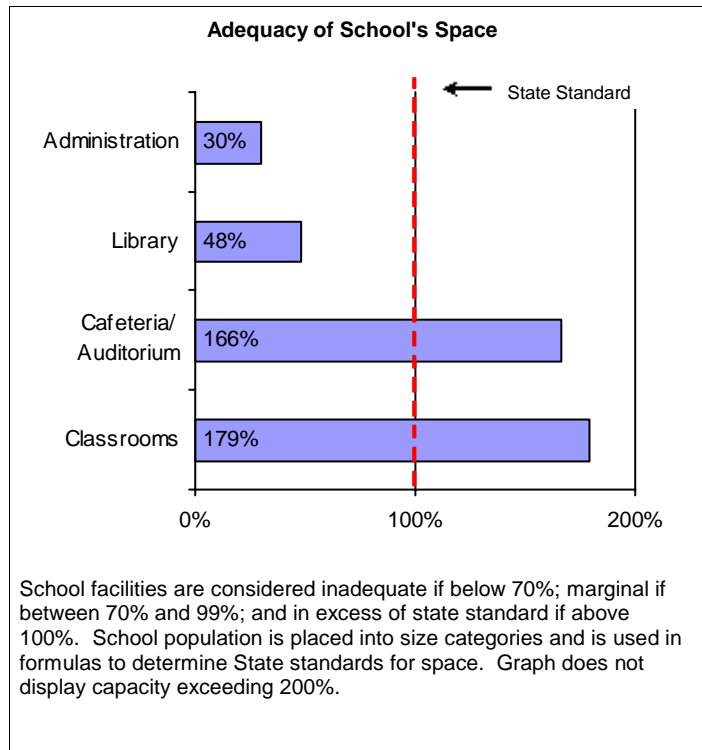

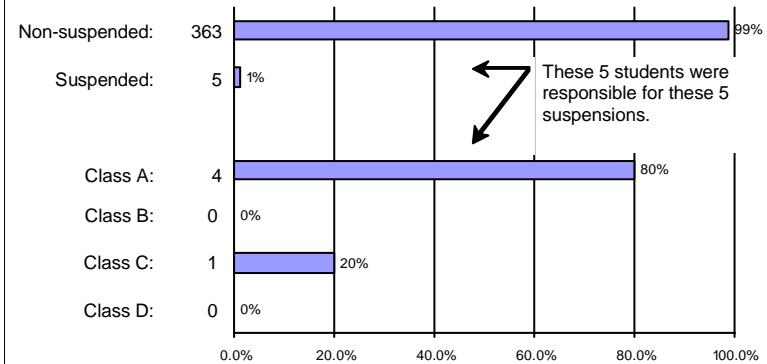
